For a research experiment, a marine biologist placed a shark into a large holding tank and then released several small bait fish into the tank. The shark quickly swam around the tank, attacked, and ate the smaller fish within minutes.

The next day, the marine biologist inserted a strong piece of clear fiberglass into the tank. She made sure that the shark was on one side of the fiberglass and placed a new set of bait fish on the other.

As you can imagine, the shark went on the attack. It slammed into the fiberglass divider over, and over, and over again as the fish swam around completely unharmed on the other side of the protective glass. This went on for about an hour until, finally, the shark gave up.

Over the next few hours, the shark made fewer attempts to attack the fish. Finally, it stopped attacking altogether. When the marine biologist removed the divider, the shark ignored the feeder fish since it continued to believe that the barrier existed between it and the fish. The fish swam wherever they wished, free from harm.

For months, we have been forced to be held behind a “divider” to isolate us from an even greater predator than a shark. While it is true that the extremely contagious and deadly COVID-19 virus has been slowed down due to wearing masks and social distancing of government-imposed regulations. The fact is the virus is still in control and will continue to divide us from our “normal” world for now.

Sadly, too many of our friends and loved ones were taken from us or infected by this plague. Unlike the shark that stopped attacking due to separation, COVID-19 will not and has not, learned this lesson. It will continue to attack until there is a readily available vaccine. That is why we must continue to act responsibly and wisely. Social distancing must be practiced until there is a permanent solution. We ended diseases like mumps, measles, polio, and other equally deadly plagues that nature conjured up and threw at us, and just like those, Gam Zeh Ya'avov—This, too, Shall Pass. It will pass, but we must take the pandemic seriously and be patient until that day comes.

This year is and will be much different from all other years that we have lived through at TNT. That does not mean the year is to be a waste. On the contrary, we are planning services and programs that will begin during Elul and will take us through the High Holy Days and then on to the Yom Tovim (Sukkot and Simchat Torah). Different? Yes, meaningful and spiritual, we can make that happen. Have an open mind and be ready. Remaining safe is our priority. We have the health and safety of our congregation first and foremost as priority number one.

In the words of Eleanor Roosevelt, “He who loses money, loses much; He who loses a friend, loses much

more; He who loses faith, loses all.” We must all learn this lesson and we should, we must keep the faith.

We will not only get through this pandemic – we will survive both physically and spiritually. Attend Zoom services, daily, weekly, or occasionally. Attend the service its as simple as following a zoom link that will transform your world from mundane to a spiritual opportunity right in the comfort of your safe home if you make it happen.

The day will come when we will be able to join together safely once again in person, until that day arrives, connect with us, stay focused on the prize. The prize is a promise of a tomorrow. Yes, there will be a tomorrow, just be patient and learn from the divider.

For those who are ill, enjoy a R'fuah Sh'leimah – (a full and complete recovery.) For the rest of us, stay safe and healthy as we all enjoy a Shanah Tovah Umetukah (a Happy, Sweet New Year 5781)

If we try to define Judaism, it's not just the study of religion and observing rituals. It's a way of thinking and living our lives. Judaism is the acknowledgement of God as the King of the Universe and how we conduct ourselves on a daily basis with that thought in mind. In addition, as Jews, we have a covenant with God to behave in a holy way. Holy actually means in a separate way. Separate in a way that we have to listen, learn, guard and perform specific commandments outlined in our Torah. Separate means we have to control our basic instincts, our urges such as hunger, sex, anger and jealousy, just to name a few. Separate means that if we want God to dwell in our presence, we have to follow His guidelines in the Torah by being a nation of priests. And by doing so, we also become an example and a light to others by leading as an example of how to treat people fairly, kindly and compassionately. We're taught to take care of the poor, the orphan and the widow. Every morning in the beginning of our prayers we read the paragraph in "Avot" that says Rabbi Y'hoshua was distressed about the temple being in ruins and that there was no longer a place to atone for our sins. His teacher Rabbi Yohanana ben Zakkai said there's another equally meritorious way of gaining atonement even though the Temple was destroyed. We can still gain atonement through deeds of loving kindness, for they are more desirable than sacrifice. In other words, you can light Shabbat candles, fast on Yom Kippur, keep kosher etc., but if you treat your fellow man harshly and hold back your money for those in need, it's all in vain, for in the end, God created us and hoped we would all get along and take care of each other. So with the High Holidays approaching, let's not only try to observe more mitzvot (which is important, that's why God gave them to us), but let's make an effort to do more deeds of lovingkindness. Put some money in the person's cup that's standing in the median strip when it's ninety degrees while you're driving to the beach. Don't roll up your window and look the other way. Roll it down, give charity and thank God for giving you an opportunity to prove yourself worthy as a loving, kind human being.

As I reflect on the past year, I need to pause and ask myself, "What happened?". Over and over again, I hear the words, "this will only be for two weeks". However, TNT has survived beyond the two weeks mostly because of the faith and support you have had in us. Rabbi Perlman, Rabbi Bernie, and Dr. Newton helped me make some difficult decisions. Did I doubt some of them at first? Absolutely. Now I know that every decision we made was for the safety and well-being of our congregation. Thank you for your understanding. A huge thank you to the members of the Ad Hoc committee, Sue Callum, John Dunn, Jodi Harold, Beth Hoffman, Mimi Levy, Jeff Newton, Elisa Zimmerman, Rabbi Bernie, and Rabbi Perlman. This committee worked and re-worked reopening plans. The plans were vetted and re-vetted again. We will continue to review and will make an announcement soon regarding a soft re-opening.

The High Holy Days will be different this year. Rabbi Perlman often reminds me that they will not be like my grandparents' High Holy Days. During the month of Elul (traditionally in the morning but not this year at TNT), the shofar is blown to remind us to do teshuvah (repentance). Teshuvah allows us to turn ourselves around and vow to do something nice.

Repentance is one element of atoning for sin in Judaism. Judaism recognizes that everybody sins on occasion, but that people can stop or minimize those occasions in the future by repenting for past transgressions.

There are four qualities of repentance. The first is responsibility. We must recognize that we have done wrong. The second is regret. We must have true remorse for doing wrong and for the pain and problems we have caused. The third is resolve. We must be committed never to repeat the act regardless of the temptations or situation. The fourth and probably the most difficult is to repair the damage we have done, or at least do what we can to apologize directly to the injured party.

Let's try to put the past 6 months behind us. However there are so many lessons we have learned these past months that we must never forget. Let's begin Rosh Hashanah on a joyous note. Let this new year be a gift for all of us. It is a time to celebrate getting a new start.

I look forward to zooming with you and as always welcome your suggestions and comments.

Due to Covid-19 times are different!!***

Due to the pandemic, the TNT Board of Trustees and the Ritual Committee voted to not offer services in person for the High Holy Days this year. All services will be available only on Zoom. Covid-19 closed the Temple building however the Temple Ner Tamid Community is going strong with daily services online, a lunch and learn every Tuesday, game nights, meetings, and other events on a regular basis.

Rabbi Perlman and Rabbi Bernie are currently working together to make the High Holy Day services, as meaningful and spiritual as possible given the health situation we are currently living in. During services, a Machzor will be displayed online for anyone who may not have a book of their own. Zoom services for our children will be offered. Our goal is to provide virtual, enlightening and age appropriate services for our children.

The High Holy Day services will be interactive (as they currently are on Shabbat) and in place of the honors of "Opening and Closing the Ark", "Holding the Torah" and actually being called to the Torah for an Aliyah, we will offer congregants readings in English and or in Hebrew. **Although you will be in your virtual home sanctuary, we ask that congregants be respectful of the Holy Days by asking men (or women who chose) to wear kippot and Tallisim.**

If you would like a Machzor or if you need of a Tallit, we will offer a few dates and times in September where you can drive up to the Temple parking lot (like the stores have been offering). We will place the items in your trunk while practicing proper social distancing and wearing gloves and masks to ensure everyone's safety.

Although the shofar will be sounded during our Zoom streamed service this year on Rosh Hashanah, we would like to enable everyone to hear the awakening sound each weekday beginning Wednesday night, August 19th during our Ma'ariv service throughout the month of Elul as we end each weekday evening service. Then we will offer an opportunity to hear the blast of the Shofar in-person during our Tashlich Service on Rosh Hashanah Day 2. Since the Shofar is not sounded on Shabbat, it will only be blown on the second day of Rosh Hashanah this year. Details to follow..

As a result, we are arranging to have the shofar sounded live on the second day of Rosh Hashanah, Sunday, September 19 at 2:00 in the afternoon at Crystal Lake in Peabody. Due to Covid-19 restrictions, we are asking people to sign up and let us know that you plan to attend so we can keep tabs on the numbers of people we are to expect. We will require the wearing of facemasks and that people social distance as well and of course this is all subject to change as the State regulations change.


