Rabbi Richard Perlman

Three friends took a trip to New York City. When they checked into their hotel, they received some good and bad news. The good news was they'd been placed in a suite on the 30th floor that had a balcony and one of the best views in the city. The bad news was the elevators were under repair and not expected to be operational for another two hours. Hotel management invited them to enjoy some complimentary refreshments, in the lounge, to pass the time. Because it was late in the evening, the trio decided to forgo the snacks and take the stairs up to their room. To pass the time and keep themselves motivated, they each agreed to take turns telling the funniest stories they could think up. When they reached the 10th floor, their once hearty laughter had been replaced by grins and occasional chuckles. On the 18th floor there were longer pauses during their storytelling. By the time they reached the 29th floor they were exhausted and breathing hard. One of the young men took a seat on the stairs and began to laugh hysterically. "You wanna know something really funny?" he asked the others. "All kidding aside, what I'm about to tell you is the truth," he said between deep breaths. "We left the room key at the front desk."

We all make choices during our lives that, at the time, appear to be correct. When we find they are not so good, we figure out ways to make the best of things. In the end, we often wish we had a do-over.

Summer is almost here. I do not have to tell you that this has been a very trying year for all of us. We have all been climbing the stairs while taking steps to keep us safe for over a year now by social distancing, wearing masks, washing our hands taking part in services and classes in our virtual zoom bubble. (At the time of this writing, the beginning of April) I am seeing lately that people are still making bad decisions. We put so much time into maintaining our and our loved ones safety but suddenly, many people who are not vaccinated or those who may be but not completely ready are letting their guard down because we are tired. We are tired of climbing the endless staircase which has protected us over the past year but darn it, the key to success remains at the bottom, where we began. We began with a belief and an understanding that pikuach nefesh (saving a life) is and must be and continue to be the priority for all. We began this climb by understanding that we will have to give up allot to make sure that we ALL remain safe.

At the bottom of the steps of this pandemic were feelings of true care and concern for others. Now, sadly, I think that covid fatigue has caused a new realization, we

may have forgotten why we gave up so much this past year.

Why do we constantly do this? Every year, many Jews choose to devote some of our time in prayer and doing acts of kindness. Others forget the reason we are so successful as a people as One society under One G d. At the end of the summer will once again come the High Holy Days and once again, we will reflect on the choices that we made during the past year. We will ask ourselves do we regret our actions or are we satisfied? How many do-overs do we wish we could have had?

We have a chance now to make the right decisions. We can continue to care for each other, be patient and not selfish as we pull slowly out of this pandemic. We can and we must work hard to recover but, we must be constantly mindful that it took allot of hard work to get us to where we are now, let us not forget where we began. Let us not take the summer off from doing the right things for each other while making the right choices in our lives.

Let us continue to join in prayer – in-person or on zoom, either way, hopefully being together in prayer will keep us focused on why we are here, why we pray and what the Jewish people are all about.

It was not until those three individuals climbed almost 30 flights of stairs before they realized what a mistake they had made. As for us, we work our way through an entire year and then once again we will be confronted by the High Holy Days. During those days we set aside time to take stock in our choices. Those who come on Shabbat and the three Festivals get more chances to realize that some of those choices should be rethought before the High Holy Days come. We need to make these choices now, today while we are standing with the keys in our hand at the front desk.

From my house to yours, may you and yours enjoy the coming summer warmth with lots of hugs, laughter, sharing of stories together with loved ones but most of all in in safety. Let this summer be better than any that came before. But please do not forget the climb that took place where we began or we will end up slipping down the banister to begin the climb again, nobody wants that.

Have a wonderful, smart, safe and enjoyable summer – See you on Shavuot, for Shabbat, for weekly and why not, for every day services, after all, it's always so nice to see you, in-person or on zoom, it doesn't matter, it's always nice to see you.

It is hard to believe that it has been a month since we participated in our Zoom community seders. What a joy to watch the first night as our Rabbis, Rabbi Perlman and Rabbi Bernie, led us. And what a delight to watch Rabbi Bernie's granddaughter recite the Four Questions. The second seder we were blessed with the Perlman Family.

As we turn the calendar to Sivan, we complete the counting of the Omer and celebrate Shavuot. Shavuot combines two major religious observances. First is the grain harvest of the early summer and second is the **giving** of the Torah on Mount Sinai.

During Shavuot we read the Book of Ruth. This story revolves around the deep relationship between the heroine, Ruth, and her mother-in-law, Naomi. As she journeys back home, Naomi urges her daughter-in-law to stay in her native Moab, but Ruth refuses, speaking these words: "For wherever you go, I will go; wherever you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God, my God".

Ruth's declaration is understood as evidence of her taking the covenant upon herself. Just as the Jewish people all gathered together at the mountain in the desert in the presence of the God of Israel, so too does Ruth cling to Naomi on the road in Moab, invoking the God of Israel. The value in the book of Ruth is chessed and loyalty. Ruth's pledge to Naomi ends with the ultimate vow: "Where you die, I will die, and there I will be buried".

Ruth's relationship to Naomi and to Torah can be a model for our own orientation to the celebration of Shavuot. In Exodus, the Israelites experience an overwhelming display of power and might that leaves them shaking in fear and desiring to distance themselves from what may emerge from those clouds around the mountain. In the book of Ruth, she bravely and wholeheartedly faces what may come down the road.

Shavuot is called "the time of the **giving** of the Torah" rather than "the time of the receiving of the Torah." The sages point out that the giving took place on one day to one people, but the receiving takes place at all times and in all generations.

As we celebrate the giving of the Torah on Shavuot, may we act each day with the love and loyalty modeled by Ruth.

I am thrilled to announce that this year, our annual fundraiser will honor Kit and Rabbi Perlman. I hope you will participate in this fundraiser. As you read in our letter, "The event will take place sometime in the Fall when, hopefully, COVID will be even further back in the rearview mirror. Rabbi Perlman has served our Congregation and Community well over the past 5 years. However, during this past "historic" year, he has certainly gone above and beyond our expectations with his leadership, creativity, and compassion. And, to paraphrase the idiom, 'Behind every great Rabbi is a great woman', which more than accurately applies to Kit."

To Your Mailbox

Here's what's been happening in the classrooms at TNT and from our homes...

From Morah Alyssa's Hebrew class... We continued to focus on getting as much done as possible.

In Bet/Gimel, we have been working hard on mastering the Hebrew vowels. The kids have been having fun using white boards as I would challenge them to write out the sounds I was creating. We are currently in the process of learning the V'ahavta for the school service.

In Daled/Hay, we have been working on a few things. We have been having some great discussions about a couple of prayers. We talked about the Mourner's Kaddish. We talked about things that give us comfort, like a stuffed animal, a song, or maybe a specific place and how the Kaddish brings comfort to those in mourning. We also talked about where our names come from and why we were given those names. Fun fact: Did you know that the Kaddish is not actually written in Hebrew? It's Aramaic! We also had fun learning question words and prepositions, creating questions about things around the classroom. We are currently working on reviewing parts of the Friday night service.

In Vav/Zayin, we continue to work on learning Torah Trope. The kids have done a great job not just learning the Trope, but also learning how to apply Trope to Hebrew. I gave everyone familiar prayers, like the Shema, and had them add Trope to the words, which they seemed to really enjoy. We are now reviewing the Friday night service.

From Rabbi Perlman's Israel class... We continued to explore how life is and was lived in Israel.

We watched "The Best of Israel video" and a video of the history of the Jewish People. We also explored detailed videos and explanations about the Dead Sea Scrolls, the secrets of the Art Garden and the discovery of King Solomon's Mines. We learned about Purim with a Virtual Book and game of Purim – I showed them how Purim is celebrated in Israel. We also learned about Passover preparation in Israel – including how to make matzah – clean kitchens, silverware, pots etc.

We have shared so much together including starting many classes with a discussion dealing with many topics and then mid semester, I asked for one thing (and explain why) that has surprised the students the most about what they have learned about Israel. I was so impressed to hear each students individual and unique explanation about what they have learned. I believe they now have a better understanding and a love for Eretz Yisrael.

In addition to some of the topics listed above, our Bet Gimel Students worked with Virtual Books and games about Israel (*David Ben Gurion, We are all Israel, and Israel Who am I*) and I showed one book about Hebrew words. They loved this fun and interactive method and they learned so much.

They learned about the "Wonder Woman" of Israel, like Golda Meir and others. We shared a lesson about all of

G-d's children – they loved the message of how we are to take care of each other and especially the animals.

It has been a very wonderful experience for the students and yes, for this Rabbi too.

From Adele's Holiday class... Students celebrated Passover and Yom Ha'atzmaut. We created Matzah covers in each class. Students in Bet / Gimel designed their own Afikomen holder as students in Daled/ Hey and Vav/ Zayin created a Cup of Elijah and a Cup of Miriam. As we approached the month of Iyar, Bet / Gimel students learned about Yom Ha'atzmaut and made suncatchers resembling the Star of David. Students in Daled – Zayin read about Yom Hashoah, Yom Hazikaron and Yom Ha'atzmaut. We watched fascinating videos of how Yom Hashoah is commemorated in Israel. We discussed what we saw, what we heard, and how we felt as a siren rang throughout the country for 2 minutes. Next on our calendar is Shavuot. Shavuot marks the wheat harvest in the Land of Israel (Exodus 34:22) and according to the Sages, it also commemorates the anniversary of the giving of the Torah by God to the Children of Israel at Mount Sinai. The word Shavuot means "weeks" and it marks the conclusion of the Counting of the Omer.

From Daniel's Bible class... Happy spring, everyone! We have been having a blast in Bible Class lately! Class time has been spent focusing on two of the best stories in the Bible (Well, at least two of Moreh Dan's favorite stories.) They are: The stories of Joseph and Moses! We read each part of Joseph's story. From his childhood with his brothers and father, his enslavement and rise to power in Egypt, and finally his reconciliation with his long lost family. We watched clips from the musical Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat as we read. We then made beautiful mini dream-coats that are displayed on the bulletin board!

We also discussed some important Jewish values such as Kinah (Jealousy) and Acharayut (Responsibility) and how these manifested in the story as well as how they appear in our daily lives. Finally, we are wrapping up Exodus by learning about Moses and the story of Passover. Everyone in class has made great connections to the story and the holiday they just celebrated. It's been such a pleasure spending Sunday mornings with these students. Their desire to learn and positivity fills me up!

From Mrs. Sugerman's Vav/Zion Life Cycle class...

Over the past couple of months we have learned: How Matzah is made (by watching videos straight from the Manichewitz and Streits factories), what it means to be Kosher and where did all the Kosher labeling originate from? We actually discovered what product was the first to be labeled Kosher. Can you guess? The answer is at the bottom of this classroom chatter. And every so often we even throw in some Jewish trivia or a group test for fun! Each week it's something different!

From the Gan/Aleph class... Thanks to Morah Beth, the Gan/Aleph students completed several projects for Passover. First, they colored a cardboard wheel that spins and reveals the 10 plagues. With her help, they also made Afikomen holders and then they depicted the "walls of water" as Moses led the Israelites across the Red Sea. Of course, we learned all about the story of Passover first and highlighted the main concepts. And for Shavuot, students learned about the meaning of the holiday and then colored and decorated "tablets" depicting the 10 commandments. In Hebrew, we finally completed learning the letters of the Aleph Bet. Now when we sing the Aleph Bet song it is so meaningful!

Other notes... This year due to Covid, we were not able to celebrate Passover with a model Seder. Instead, we held a "Cooking in Class" event where we prepared charoset live on Zoom. It was like having our very own TNT cooking show! First we learned about the Seder plate and charoset. Then we learned about the differences between Ashkenazi and Sephardic styles of charoset. Thanks to Morah Beth, Morah Alyssa and her Mom Mona for sharing their charoset recipes with us and welcoming us into their kitchens for this amazing event!

Answer to my question: Did you know that Heinz canned beans was the first product ever labeled with a Kosher Symbol?

As we take small steps toward a complete reopening of our Temple building, many of us are contemplating what we have learned from the pandemic experience. Has any good come out of our thirteen months of isolation from one another? What have we learned about ourselves in this time?

First and foremost, we have learned to rely on our inner strength, to be resilient in the face of adversity, and to learn new ways to connect with one another. It has certainly been a blessing that we live in an age of technology that has enabled us to continue to pray as a community, to meet with one another, and to socialize together, albeit from afar. Many of us have found the joy of celebrating holidays and family events with friends and relatives from across the country. No, it's not the same as being in person, but it's still a worthwhile and enjoyable venture. The pandemic has pushed the limits of our creativity as we have found new ways to occupy our time at home, cooked up new recipes, and become more innovative with our organizational meetings and programs.


